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ARTIST STATEMENT

In Malaysia, natives believe in dreams and interpretation, with some interpreting them for daily life guidance. Senai people in Perak interpret dreams for fighting, repelling reinforcements, and cured diseases. They believe that every dream told by the tribe is important for making decisions in life. This belief is evident in the use of indigenous masks to visualize the narration of their dreams. The mask represents the narration of dreams, transforming them into real images through creativity. The mask, resembling a warrior's expression, is printed on gold paper to convey the narrative of dreams. Mirrors add an additional meaning to the transformation of dreams into reality. This work explores native dreams as a new form of print art and the transformation of dreams into reality.

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ARTIST STATEMENT

As more and more photographers and filmmakers in Malaysia find the distinct vantage points and breathtaking aerial views that can be recorded with drones, the practice of drone photography is becoming an increasingly popular form of photography. Photography opportunities abound in Malaysia thanks to the country's varied topography, which features tropical rainforest, mountain ranges, and attractive coastlines, among other natural wonders.

Experiencing in using DJI Mavic Mini Drone, the photographer took use of this unique drone shooting to create works at a charcoal plant, situated in Kuala Sepetang, Perak Malaysia. This charcoal factory is a renowned tourist attraction. The charcoal made from mangrove wood is famously made in the old-fashioned technique and has been the centre of the charcoal wood business since 1930s, and its goods are regularly in great demand since they are among the best in the world.

Shooting from a perspective known as Bird's Eye View, from this vantage 90° point, pictures of vast landscapes, detailed patterns, and the general layout of a place can be taken. The challenge during the shooting is the photographer must think about a wide range of factors, including lines, shapes, textures, and patterns, to capture interesting subjects. When shooting from above, it's more important than ever to carefully position your subjects in respect to one another and the frame. Photographer also need to adapt to the movement and vibrations associated with aerial platforms to achieve sharp and clear images.


An alive witness? When the witnesses are silence, the interrogation began. The tangibility of your body parts became your whole bare witnesses. I was here, I was there, I did this and did that.




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ARTIST STATEMENT




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ARTIST STATEMENT


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ARTIST STATEMENT

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
ARTIST STATEMENT




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ARTIST STATEMENT















"Nut Tree And Old Houses Entrance - Türkiye East Black Sea Endemic Blackberry tree and old houses



Reference - Turkey East Black Sea Endemic Blackberry tree and old houses represent a local culture. In addition to eating the fruits of the nut tree, it also protected the houses against the wind, as it was resistant to wind with its dense leaves and very strong tree trunk. Since the toilets were usually outside the house in this house architecture, the dense leaves of these trees allowed those who went to the toilet to go unseen. Its fruit is very good for diabetes patients, as well as its fruits such as black and pink, round and long. One of the pictures I drew in a short film and painting project made to keep the culture alive and promoted.


